Why Spay or Neuter Your Pet?

- Help all pets by reducing the number of dogs and cats that will become homeless.
- Reduce the tax dollars spent annually to care for lost, abandoned and unwanted pets.
- Protect the public health and safety threatened by rabies, dog bites and cat scratches caused by homeless animals.
- Reduce the number of unwanted offspring of family pets that will die from exposure, starvation, disease or euthanasia.
- Reduce the urge to roam or spray.
- Improve the health of your pet by reducing the incidence of breast tumors, prostate cancer, testicular tumors, pyometra, and mastitis.
- Spaying and Neutering is cheaper in the long run than caring for litters.
- Having a litter is not necessary for a female to "settle down."
- The instinct for a dog to "protect his turf" will not be reduced by neutering.
- Males need to be neutered as they can easily father hundreds of offspring.
- Females need to be spayed to prevent overpopulation caused by unwanted litters.
- Dogs and cats don't have the same "emotional needs" as people. They won't notice a change if they are spayed or neutered.
- Pets won't get "fat and lazy" when they eat right and get exercise.
- It is not "interfering with nature". We did that when we domesticated cats and dogs.
- Most pets can be spayed or neutered when they are 2 months old to five months old.
- Older pets can usually be spayed or neutered too.
